### **9:00 Welcome and Introduction, Charles Gauthier (DEP) and Kathleen Harrigan (SAIC)**

- Samantha Fillmore (Wekiva Basin Coordinator) and John Abendroth (Watershed Planning and Coordination Administrator) have left the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP).
- Charles Gauthier has joined FDEP as an Environmental Administrator of the Watershed Planning and Coordination Section. Since the end of November Charles has also served as the Wekiva Basin Coordinator. His contact information is at the bottom of the agenda.
- Rick Hicks, Administrator of the Groundwater and Springs Section has also been significantly involved in the development of the draft BMAP. Both Rick Hicks and Charles Gauthier have been involved in other DEP or BMAP meetings. Charles and Rick will continue to be involved in the finalization process for the Wekiva BMAP. Ken Kuhl (of the DEP NPDES MS4 section) has joined the Watershed Planning and Coordination Section as a Basin Coordinator.
- Basin working group members should verify their contact information on the sign in sheets.
- The purpose of this meeting is to go through each section of the draft BMAP with Basin Working Group members. At this stage in the BMAP review process, our primary goal is to capture the information submitted by Basin Working Group members accurately. Consequently, we suggest starting with questions from Basin Working Group members. Subsequently, we will open the floor for public comment and discussion. The official public comment period, including Basin Working Group members, ends March 31. .

### **9:07 Opening Remarks, Charles Gauthier, FDEP**

Restoring water quality in groundwater systems is especially challenging. Florida is unique in that it has this proactive, collaborative process to resolve water quality problems. Florida takes a comprehensive approach to springs and land protection. Wastewater standards, land use development, agricultural BMPs, etc., are only one part of the approach. By participating in numerous BMAP development and implementation efforts statewide, the Department hopes to share successful approaches and ideas with stakeholders in the Wekiva Basin. As we move ahead we will hold annual meetings and after five years there will be major reassessment of the BMAP. I thank everyone who has done the work. Hopefully we have put a good product in front of you; if not, please let us know.

## 9:14 Summary of Wekiva River, Rock Springs Run, and the Little Wekiva Canal BMAP

### Overview of BMAP Development Process

- A BMAP is a way to restore waters that have a TMDL. The BMAP document outlines projects, expectations, and other relevant information during three five year cycles. DEP has a five year monitoring process for TMDL development. The BMAP process is anchored with adaptive management strategies, and consequently, may change as new information is considered.. For instance, some restoration projects may begin before a TMDL or BMAP process has begun. Assessment and monitoring are ongoing.
- The planning area in this basin includes a springshed and a surface watershed which present new challenges in terms of BMAP development. The western portion of the planning area contributes predominately to the springshed because the surface water in that area flows to the Ocklawaha Basin. The eastern portion of the planning area is predominately a surface watershed for the Wekiva River but there is overlap in some areas between the springshed and watershed.
- Some projects described in the BMAP benefit surface water contributions while others address groundwater loading.
- There are many representatives in the Basin Working Group from 11 towns and cities, 3 counties, the Department of Health, various state agencies, Sanlando Utilities Corp., Friends of the Wekiva, etc.. This representation is important to ensure that we have representatives from every jurisdiction in the basin. Some representatives are not present today but that does not mean that they are not involved. There has been good representation from jurisdictional stakeholders.
- The draft BMAP has six chapters and many appendices. The first three provide background information like BMAP basin planning area and other maps, the purpose of the BMAP, impairments, and pollutant sources. Chapter four discusses management actions. Chapter five discusses how to assess the response to these actions and includes information on the monitoring plan, studies, and any missing information. Chapter six is comprised of the commitment to the plan by stakeholders. The appendices provide additional supporting information.
- Basin Working Group comments are due by March 31, 2013. Once these comments are received and addressed we will release another draft of the BMAP and hold a public meeting. At the close

of that public comment period the document will be adopted by secretarial order. Our goal is to have that all completed by spring. Comments received before the March 31<sup>th</sup> deadline are not limited to the basin working group.

#### **9:20 Review and Discussion of Major Elements of the BMAP, Rick Hicks FDEP**

- A TMDL is a surface water body restoration target. TMDLs were developed for two segments of the Wekiva River. Dr. Gao wrote a TMDL for one segment in 2008 which was adopted by rule for nitrate and total phosphorus. A TMDL for the Wekiva Canal was adopted in 2008 for total nitrogen and BOD because of low dissolved oxygen in the canal.
- There are two sources for pollutants in this system. One is the direct runoff to the streams which may be more limited than previously discussed. The primary source is groundwater to the springs.
- (Figure 1.1 from the Draft BMAP) The dark areas on the map are the primary recharge areas for the groundwater basin as defined by Brian McGurk (SJWMD). That area is primarily responsible for producing water that comes out of the spring system.
- (Figure 2.3 from the Draft BMAP) There is a lot more discharge east of Rock Springs. The lighter shaded areas are more vulnerable with less confinement and more recharge.
- TMDLs are not always expressed as loads; they can also be expressed as concentrations. The Wekiva TMDL is based on concentration target of 0.286 mg/L of nitrates based on multiple sources of data that allowed for the development of this threshold for algal growth. The threshold for the Little Wekiva Canal is based on loads and calculated differences (Tables 1.5 and 1.6 from the Draft BMAP).
- Some of the water bodies in this TMDL are not impaired but do contribute to other segments which are impaired. The Little Wekiva River and Blackwater Creek are examples.
- The total phosphorus target concentration is 0.065 mg/L. A percentage of that load comes from naturally occurring material in the aquifer.
- Historical records show that nitrate concentrations are decreasing in the lower segment of the Wekiva River, while concentrations in other segments have remained stable. Total phosphorus concentrations have been very consistent. (Table 2.2 from the Draft BMAP)

- Non point sources are a major contribution in this system. Non point sources include surface water sources that do not require permits. Point sources from wastewater treatment facilities are minimal, since these sources discharge only during emergency situations.
- Nutrient sources vary and include: domestic wastewater, atmospheric deposition, natural sources, septic tanks, animal wastes, and fertilizers. Phosphorus may release from clay material contained in the confining layer of the aquifer (Hawthorne Formation).
- We used two approaches for estimated loads and reductions: discharge from the springs (Table 3.4 from the Draft BMAP) and loads associated with the runoff model (Table 3.3 from the Draft BMAP). These two approaches overlap somewhat so we may want to revise this. This methodology was based on land use data for the year 2000 so that modeling could be updated with more recent land use data. We hope to come up with a more accurate estimation of the total load for the basin than what these overlapping models currently provide.

#### **9:40 Management Actions, Kathleen Harrigan SAIC**

- We have collected a large number of projects that date back to 2000. We used projects from that date because of the long residence time of pollutants in groundwater. Because of that time delay, we would not expect to see an immediate benefit in the spring from implemented projects or management actions.
- To be included in this BMAP, projects had to be part of the planning area. Only projects that went above and beyond permit requirements were included. We have also listed wastewater treatment plants because the significant reductions achieved since 2000..
- There are lots of nonpoint sources. Jody Lee of FDACS gave a presentation on agricultural BMPs last July which is available on our ftp site.
- WWTP projects, stream bank restoration, exotic plant removal, local ordinances, public education activities, and road paving projects with treatment have been incorporated into this BMAP. Land use designations that changed from agricultural use to conservation or other uses were also included.
- Table 4.3 from the Draft BMAP displays a list of facilities that treat wastewater within the basin. Chris Ferraro, DEP's Central District Office, is the contact person for details on this. Chris gave a presentation in 2009 about the wastewater treatment facility improvements required by the Wekiva Wastewater rules which is summarized as part of the BMAP document.

- Sanitary sewer collection system repair efforts that went above and beyond the permit requirements to reduce leakages and make things more efficient were included in the BMAP. Some examples include the expansion of collection systems to connect septic tanks, and the Wekiwa State Park and the Zellwood area transition to sewer systems. This project type spans 9 Basin Working Group members and has 47 projects in it. (Table 4.2 from the Draft BMAP)
- Eleven Basin Working Group members did extensive work from a rehabilitation standpoint in regards to surface water and springshed projects. Permitted facilities that went above and beyond the baseline requirements in inspections, rehabilitation, street sweeping, and dirt road paving received credit for these activities in the BMAP. (Table 4.5 from the Draft BMAP)
- Additional projects addressed public education, bank stabilization, exotic vegetation removal, land preservation and conservation, and wetland preservation as well as future studies to assess pollutant loads. These projects were implemented by twelve Basin Working Group members (continuation of Table 4.5 from the Draft BMAP).
- A lot of irrigation ordinances are included that address fertilizer issues. There were studies done that examined whether people knew how much fertilizer they should use and found that most people do not. Many of the public education projects in the BMAP address pet waste and fertilizer issues. (Table 4.10 from the Draft BMAP)
- There are about 50,000 acres dedicated to agricultural use in the planning area. Of these, 6,000 acres have enrolled in BMPs. FDACS is focused on cow and calf practices which make up 22,000 acres in the planning area. Some horse farm operations within the planning area are not large enough to be addressed by the standard agricultural BMPs so those will require a separate educational effort. (Table 4.16 from the Draft BMAP)
- The nitrate and phosphorus load estimation may be high because of the limitations of our ability to distinguish between the overlapping groundwater and surface water loadings. Many different approaches were considered to determine how to credit load reduction. Project estimation numbers associated with projects were provided by Basin Working Group members. The estimated loads going into the system subtracted by the projected load reductions provided by the stakeholders show that the projects are making a good effort at reducing pollutant loads. Rick Hicks is trying to improve the estimated load numbers because there is some redundancy in the watersheds that overlap. (Table 4.15 and 4.16 from the Draft BMAP)

- Basin Working Group members should review their projects to ensure that the information in the BMAP is accurate and complete. Let the basin coordination team know if anything else should be added. Any new load reduction data that should be included.

| Chuck O'Neil, League of Women Voters: In one of the tables it said that goal is to reduce total nitrogen concentrations in Wekiva Springs by 79 percent and phosphorus by 64 percent. How does that table relate to reaching those numbers if the greatest projected reduction is 35%? | <p>Kathleen Harrigan, SAIC: The numbers shown are associated with individual projects which are only a subset of our total project list. Groundwater load reductions were harder to quantify. The actual effect of the BMAP is bigger than those projects that are listed there.</p> <p>Rick Hicks, FDEP: The 79% is a reduction of nitrate loading and not of nitrate concentration. It's difficult to alternate between concentrations and loadings. Projects have load reductions that result in concentration reductions. The overlap issue that we discussed with the land use loading model and the spring loading makes these calculations more difficult. We hope to figure that out and get more accurate numbers by the next version of the document.</p> <p>Chris Ferraro, FDEP: The 35% reduction also doesn't include the public education or ordinances that local governments have adopted. There are no calculated load reductions associated with those.</p> |

| Sister Pat Siemen, CEJ: Does this plan have any kind of allocated load reductions for agriculture? I know that agricultural interests will have to implement BMPs but since agriculture is about 32% percent of the land use in the planning area are there projected allocation reductions there?                  | Kathleen Harrigan, SAIC: Some BMAPs have specific allocated reduction goals but that was not possible in this basin because of the complexity of groundwater influence. There are no allocations for agriculture practices or any other activities in the watershed. They have committed to implementing their BMPs with their producers which will have a reduction effect.                                                                        |
| Chris Ferraro, FDEP: Where did the 32% of load from agriculture come from?<br><br>Note: The MACTEC report uses a larger basin that included more agricultural area than the planning area for this BMAP.                                                                                                            | Kathleen Harrigan, SAIC: The 32% is from 2002 MACTEC report.<br><br>Kathleen Harrigan, SAIC: FDACS will look at the specific acreage which they associate with active agricultural commodities in the planning area and then associate that with different commodities to implement their BMPs. They are also doing that in many of the adjoining basins.                                                                                           |
| Chuck O'Neil, League of Women Voters: If you reduce a load of total nitrogen but then also grant consumptive use permits for further reduction of the water does the impact of flow reduction negate the benefit of decreased nutrient loading? Will the decreased water levels result in increased concentrations? | Robert Mattson, SJWMD: Interestingly enough a year ago Erich R. Marzolf and I did study to show a strong positive correlation between nitrate concentration and flow. What we found is the opposite. Increased flows produced increase nitrate concentrations. That correlation was very strong in Wekiwa Springs and not as strong in Rock Springs. The take home message of that study is that we have to reduce the nitrate load above all else. |

#### 10:15 Monitoring, Kathleen Harrigan SAIC

- There are several monitoring partners in the Basin Working Group that monitor surface water and groundwater, springs, flow, and perform biological assessments. (Table 5.1 from the Draft BMAP)
- Core monitoring sites and supplemental monitoring sites have been established for surface water. The goal was to identify sites that were sampled frequently enough (at least quarterly) to establish a sufficient monitoring routine. This frequency is important for surface waters where we hope to get data on seasonal variation across the basin. Fortunately, an extensive historical

database exists for this watershed which allows for comparison and the establishment of long term trends. Supplemental sites are not sampled quarterly.

- The BMAP describes two monitoring objectives. The primary objective is long term trend monitoring. The second objective is to eventually focus management efforts on what is working and determining the sufficiency of these actions.
- All of the groundwater stations listed are to be collected as core stations. We will adjust those a bit to be sure that we are getting surficial groundwater measurements and not the deeper wells. (Table 5.2 from Draft BMAP)
- The basin working group decided on a group of core parameters and supplemental parameters. The groundwater monitoring includes a different set of parameters than the surface water monitoring. The supplemental parameters help interpret the core parameters. Basin Working Group members should verify that the correct parameters are listed for their respective agencies. (Table 5.8A and 5.8B from Draft BMAP).
- Algal surveys are mainly performed by the Water Management District. Other agencies will perform algal assessments for a total of 20 algal stations.
- Flow monitoring stations have been added to this BMAP. Some of the stations are collocated with monitoring stations.
- Previously we had supplemental surface water and groundwater monitoring associated with permits (i.e. spray fields, etc). We eliminated those from this document but have identified those for which there is data available that we can request if the need arises. We will be working with those permitting entities.
- Appendix F holds details for this information so Basin Working Group members should review the list for accuracy and be sure that they are comfortable maintaining that monitoring frequency.

Monitoring sites are listed in the tables because right now we do not have any stations associated with the Rapid Periphyton Survey. We appreciate any updates you might have. Thank you for reminding us of the new assessment tools. |

I may be wrong in my assessment of what that will actually give us but a one size fits all approach seems problematic. It must take into account soil considerations, flow, etc. Do they need another year of funding to finish that study and have those tools study? Septic systems owners have large out of pocket cost associated with any potential legislation and their return on that investment is determined by how good your science is. | Charles Gauthier, FDEP: You have made some important points and there are many that are anxious for the outcome of this study. We have over two million septic tanks in the state so we understand your concern and are anxious to see the outcome that is most cost effective. One size does not fit all. Thank you. |

#### **Research and Implementation, Charles Gauthier FDEP**

- The SJWMD is embarking on important springs research. I am certain there will be some focus on this particular system in addition to others. This research should provide an excellent platform for the second generation of this BMAP process.
- The research portion of the BMAP identifies areas where more research is needed. This BMAP will require an evolving understanding of acreage and crop types. We will have to improve our land use inventories and update load estimates.
- FDEP will stage an annual process to check on the progress of projects, water quality trends, issues/problems, and research updates as part of our adaptive management approach.

**10:30 Next steps, Kathleen Harrigan SAIC**

- The Basin Working Group comment period will be extended for another 30 days which will move the rest of our proposed target dates back by about two weeks. The final draft of the BMAP will probably be available by the end of April but that depends largely on the types of comments received.
- Basin Working Group members should review the draft BMAP for accuracy and verify that all monitoring and research efforts have been documented. Letters of commitment from Basin Working Group members should be submitted at this time. These letters are not necessary for the enforcement of the BMAP but are valuable expressions of commitment from stakeholders.

During the 1986 session my first bill was to outlaw the use of septic tanks and I had my hat handed to me. We work with the Water Management District with their grant writing and they mentioned that we could also be made available to local governments as a free service that the WMD will pay for. | <p>Chuck O'Neil, League of Woman Voters: Is it possible to put together a timetable for the achievement of these reductions in the springs?</p>           | <p>Kathleen Harrigan, SAIC: It is generally very difficult to anticipate the response times for things associated with water bodies. Sometimes the response time is shorter because of certain projects like NuRF, the Northshore Restoration Area, etc. It is difficult to estimate a timeline and that is why we have periodic check in times. The groundwater component makes this process even more difficult because of groundwater retention times. The average age of the water is seventeen years. Some of the water takes upwards of 100 years to get to the surface. Other factors keep changing too so this process requires a constant monitoring effort. What we can expect are load reductions associated with specific projects and implementation dates.</p> |

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| <p>From what I understand is that underneath the freshwater that comes from the aquifer is older saltwater. I was told that no one knows where the divide between freshwater and saltwater is and that some wells are actually producing saltwater.</p> | <p>Rick Hicks, FDEP: In certain areas of the St. Johns River, particularly in Sanford, there does tend to be an upwelling of salt which is a natural occurrence. The freshwater aquifer is underlain by saline water. In drought conditions we have seen some increase in salinity in our springs.</p> <p>They are not all going salty but there is a gradual trend in increased salinity. As we have less fresh water there is more of a mixing of that. The WMD is doing all kinds of things to manage consumption in light of this.</p> <p>Rob Mattson, SJWMD: A year ago when I gave an update on the water quality status in this watershed I noted that the conductivity in the Wekiva and Rock Springs was increasing and that is the result of consumptive use problems as well as decreased rainfalls.</p> |

The BMAP adoption phase will not delay the restoration process as many of the projects described in the BMAP are occurring or will begin soon.
