

Summary of Coastal Watershed Challenges and Needs in Northwest Florida

The tables below provide an initial representation of the challenges facing coastal watersheds in northwest Florida. General strategies appropriate for addressing these challenges are also indicated. The information presented is not necessarily comprehensive and it has not been reviewed by external agencies. Many of the challenges and strategies listed could be applied generically to most if not all coastal systems. The information provided below, however, is intended summarize the major challenges and associated strategies specific to each watershed listed.

Apalachicola River and Bay System

Inclusive of Apalachicola Bay, St. Vincent Sound, East Bay, St. George Sound, Alligator Harbor, and tributary rivers and streams

Plans:

(2) *Tates Hell State Forest Hydrologic Restoration Plan*

Pensacola Bay System

Inclusive of Pensacola, Escambia, Blackwater, and East bays; western Santa Rosa Sound; Big Lagoon; and tributary rivers and streams

Degraded seagrass habitats, Escambia, Pensacola, and East bays; possibly Santa Rosa Sound and Big Lagoon (per DEP report)	Seagrass assessments; water quality improvement projects; urban stormwater retrofit projects; stormwater best management practices; riparian buffer protection, and shoreline restoration
Local outreach and stakeholder coordination	Funding assistance for local watershed initiatives
Discharge of treated wastewater into surface waters and sprayfields	Advanced wastewater treatment; Reuse of reclaimed water
Degraded urban bayou habitats, including littoral habitat loss and sediment degradation and toxicity	Bayou basin plans; best management practices; stormwater retrofits; habitat restoration and sediment remediation
Potential marine invasive species	Assessment of the potential for marine invasive species problems, including related to biofouling, commercial vessel ballast, and the adequacy of management practices. Lead agencies anticipated to include FFWC, DACS, federal agencies, and commercial ports.

Choctawhatchee River and Bay Watershed

Inclusive of Choctawhatchee Bay, eastern Santa Rosa Sound, the Choctawhatchee River, contributing tributary streams, and the coastal dune lakes

(2) Local Stormwater Master Plans – Fort Walton Beach, Destin, Niceville, Okaloosa County, Walton County, possibly more

St. Andrew Bay Watershed

Inclusive of West Bay, St. Andrew Bay, North Bay, East Bay, St. Joseph Bay, Lake Powell, and tributary streams

Degradation of coastal dune lake water and habitat quality (Lake Powell)	Implementation of stormwater treatment systems, riparian buffer zones, and other best management practices
Potential marine invasive species	Assessment of the potential for marine invasive species problems, including related to biofouling, commercial vessel ballast, and the adequacy of management practices. Lead agencies anticipated to include FFWC, DACS, federal agencies, and commercial ports.

Ochlockonee River and Bay Watershed

Including Ochlockonee Bay, the Ochlockonee River, and tributary streams

Karst region nutrient enrichment affecting Apalachee Bay and its tributaries	Karst effective stormwater and wastewater systems to reduce nutrient and other pollutant loading – research, demonstration projects, and implementation and retrofit projects
Disposal of treated wastewater within the Wakulla Karst Plain	Advanced wastewater treatment upgrades for domestic wastewater treatment plants; reuse of reclaimed water

Inadequate rural wastewater management	Advanced onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems, connection fee assistance, monitoring, and establishment and funding of responsible management entities
High bacteria and nutrient levels in Apalachee Bay	Funding for advanced onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems and karst-effective stormwater and wastewater treatment systems

Perdido River and Bay Watershed

Needs for protection and restoration of estuarine embayments, including Bayou Garcon, Tarkiln Bay, and others	Bayou basin plans; best management practices; stormwater retrofits; habitat restoration and sediment remediation
Loss of shoreline and littoral habitat due to shoreline alteration and erosion	Shoreline protection and restoration (e.g., riparian buffer zones and shoreline habitat restoration)
Degraded urban stream systems, resulting in habitat loss, sedimentation, and discharge of poor quality water into Perdido Bay	Stream restoration using natural channel design techniques
Discharge of treated wastewater into surface waters and sprayfields	Advanced wastewater treatment; reuse of reclaimed water
Overall diminished bay water quality and habitat quality	Reduction of industrial and domestic wastewater discharges; advanced treatment systems; construction of urban stormwater retrofits
