This project would provide a myriad of year-round nature and outdoor recreational experiences for all visitors to the Woolley Park – Big Bend Maritime Museum area through several improvements and restoration of existing facilities, piers, and other structures as well as add some essential features. It would protect and enhance the environment, native vegetation, and wildlife and coastal waters by providing stormwater solutions and provide safe but, unobtrusive opportunities for visitors to view and fully utilize the area for multiple purposes including viewing wildlife, canoe/kayak launching, photography, fishing or just simply enjoying the beauty of the area. This project will support the annual events that are held at the park such as the annual Blue Crab Festival and the Big Bend Maritime Mullet Festival. It will also help to stabilize and beautify the area making it more attractive and safe to all visitors, encouraging tourism, nature enthusiasts and as mentioned earlier, stabilizing the environment for native vegetation, wildlife, and marine life.

This project proposes adding the following:

- Add a large picnic shelter (pre-fabricated)
- Two small shelters (pre-fabricated)
- Add parking lot and canoe launch
- Construct new parking lot
- Feature entrance gateway to Big Bend Maritime Center
- Pave Maritime Center Drive
- Add amphitheater (pre-fabricated)
- Add new restrooms (pre-fabricated)
- Landscaping
- Boardwalk & gazebos
- Add outdoor game area
- Signing and wayfinding

It is estimated that this project could cost \$1,965,800, however it could be more or less since cost estimates are based on using cost from professional consultants volunteering their services and costs for recent unrelated projects.

Anticipated Project Outcome with Respect to Screening Criteria

Wakulla County has a great amount of experience with this type of project. In fact, the County constructed the existing piers and boardwalks which will be very similar in construction techniques and permitting. The County also has experience in parking facility improvements. The County plans to use a professional engineer to design and permit the new facility improvements in several locations as depicted on the Conceptual Master Plan for Wooley Park. This will involve design, permitting, and CEI to support the construction services.

This project would provide dedicated paths and observation platforms providing visitors dedicated paths for viewing areas while visiting the Woolley Park-Big Bend Maritime Museum area. It would provide a safe environment for visitors fishing or enjoying the two piers located at the site, as well as connecting to the two piers with a boardwalk. These improvements would steer visitors away from and off of sensitive or unsafe areas as they explore and take in the total experience that this area has to offer. It will work toward stabilizing the entire area, providing for better experience for all visitors as well as helping to improve the native vegetation, wildlife habitat, coastal water, and stormwater issues.

Anticipated Project Outcome with Respect to Evaluation Criteria

E1. Will restore, rehabilitate, or replace a natural resource or service¹ believed/demonstrated to have been injured as a result of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill or associated response activities: *(Briefly describe the nature of any relationship between the new/improved resources or services and those adversely impacted by the oil spill.)*

Wakulla County, like the other 7 counties from Escambia County to Wakulla County, experienced negative perceptions leading to a decline in tourism, sports fisherman, and seafood sales. The County continues to experience some negative perceptions and concerns for the health and of its seafood, including that of the ecosystems/habitats required for local species to live and thrive.

E2. Is located in, or nearby, resources or services injured by the deepwater horizon spill: *(Briefly describe where the project would be implemented with respect to past/ongoing remediation work.)*

These projects are located in the area of the deepwater horizon spill.

Much in-kind work has been completed for this project by volunteers, County staff and its elected officials. Some of the County's consultants volunteered to provide information and planning services to assist with visioning future improvements and to determine the planning-level costs for the project. The Conceptual Master Plan (enclosed) depicts much of this body of work. Currently, the County does not have the funding to move forward with the Woolley Park project as outlined in this application. It is the hope of the County that funds from this application could be used for engineering design, permitting and construction. Cost estimates for this project, as stated above were done through volunteers and costs for recent unrelated projects.

E4. Is cost effective: *(Briefly describe why you think the project is cost effective. Discuss whether this project is more cost effective than alternative projects which would provide similar resource or service benefits.)*

This project is highly cost effective since this area represents one of the most high-profile beach access points in the unincorporated area of Panacea, in Wakulla County which was hit hard by the oil spill events. Woolley Park represents one of the County's attempts at ecosystem and environmental restoration since this area is a representation of the marine habitat that supports many of the residents of this area by providing visitors with nature viewing and recreation opportunities. Due to the efforts of the County and through previous funding and grant opportunities, Wakulla County was able to make significant strides in improving the park but it still needs significant improvement to meet the needs of the community. In particular, the amphitheater is needed for music festivals and the canoe launch area is much needed since this would be the only one in this part of the County. This area will have a very high benefit to the community as it will foster opportunities for interactions with the unique natural environment. These park facilities improvements are needed since the County does not have any other similar facilities nearby.

E5. Has a high potential for long-term success as demonstrated by incorporating established/reliable methods and technologies: *(Briefly describe if/how critical methods and technologies that will be used to implement the project could be considered reliable or proven.)*

Prior to the oil spill, this park was used widely by members of the community for festivals and for general recreation. As a result of the oil spill, much of those users went away. The park amenities improvements will bring those users back. There are many similar facility projects that can be sited and many of these are located in Florida. These similar projects can be used for estimated project costs and they are very similar in permitting requirements. In summary, these types of projects have been completed recently in Wakulla County and there are multiple contractors who would be expected to bid on such a project.

E6. Is likely to provide benefits rapidly following implementation: *(Briefly describe the anticipated change in benefits anticipated over time.)*

It is believed that this project would have immediate results and benefits to the economy of County as well as the environment. The County has a new and ongoing program of advertising and promoting the County as an ecotourism destination. This park would be a part of that type of promotion. As stated earlier, this park is used for festivals and major events such as the Blue Crab Festival and the Big Bend Maritime Festival. This effort has resulted in increased visitors. The County expects that with the improvements to Woolley Park, it will then have a new beach destination that will be a major attractor to the surrounding counties and the region. This project would have a significant and immediate positive impact on Wakulla County and the surrounding region. As depicted in the Conceptual Master Plan there are many other facility improvements that are ongoing which further emphasizes the need for this project.

Through community visioning efforts and a community survey that was conducted, there is a high-level of support for this project. Ecotourism opportunities are a key component to the County's vision of creating the County as a National and International destination. The County desires to improve all aspects of its natural environment and the citizens of Wakulla County know that this is its greatest resource. It is believed that this project will greatly benefit the overall park and because of the immediate results to increasing visitors as they enjoy the wildlife and the total nature experience offered at Woolley Park.
