



Grayton Beach State Park

Grayton Beach State Park protects, interprets, and provides recreational public access to 2,187 acres of beach dune, scrub, and wetlands surrounding a system of highly significant coastal dune lakes south of County Road 30A. The park provides a more primitive visitor experience with significant conservation value north of County Road 30A, protecting a large tract of intact uplands, including flatwoods and sandhill. Proposed improvements at this park will enhance visitation and the quality of the visitor experience within the footprints of existing use areas and facilitate additional recreational and interpretive opportunity. Identified projects will also promote connectivity to the adjacent Point Washington State Forest and accommodate visitor access from neighboring communities by boat.
