

FLORIDA DEEPWATER HORIZON OTHER SETTLEMENT PROJECT



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LAND ACQUISITION

Escribano Point

Acquisition of this property provides for the protection of 10.4 miles of shoreline along Blackwater Bay and East Bay, by buffering water flow into Pensacola Bay and the Gulf of Mexico. Escribano Point is being managed by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Total award amount: \$2,470,000

Background

The state of Florida received \$10 million in the form of a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) and civil penalties under a June 18, 2012 Consent Decree between MOEX Offshore 2007 LLC, a 10-percent non-operating investor in the lease on the Macondo well at the time of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, and the U.S. Department of Justice. The SEP was in the form of land acquisition and the civil penalties were utilized for stormwater management projects. The Florida Attorney General's office played an instrumental role in securing this relief, consistent with its role in representing the Department of Environmental Protection and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission on oil spill related matters.

Funding Breakdown

- \$5 million was utilized by The Trust for Public Land to acquire two environmentally sensitive land parcels in the Panhandle.
- \$5 million is being utilized for seven stormwater retrofit projects throughout the Panhandle.

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LAND ACQUISITION

Seven Runs Creek

The 2,336 acre conservation easement at Seven Runs Creek, which is a part of the Florida Forever project in Walton County, is being managed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands.

Total award amount: \$2,400,000

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STORMWATER PROJECT

Bay County Stormwater Project

The Spring Avenue stormwater management project included the construction of a new stormwater treatment pond to improve water quality of discharges that are received into Watson Bayou while also maintaining a park like setting.

Total award amount: \$774,775

Background

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STORMWATER PROJECT

Panama City Stormwater Project

The Lisenby Avenue Stormwater Management Facility (later dedicated by the City as Hammonds Memorial Park) includes a wet detention stormwater treatment pond with upland irrigation that will improve water quality before discharging into St. Andrew Bay. The area around the treatment pond and irrigated areas includes a walking path in a park like setting.

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Total award amount: \$870,497

Background

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STORMWATER PROJECT

City of Destin Stormwater Project

This stormwater improvement project included the installation of a hydrodynamic separator prior to stormwater runoff from Hwy 98 in downtown Destin being discharged into Destin Harbor.

Total award amount: \$251,805

Background

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STORMWATER PROJECT

City of Fort Walton Beach Stormwater Project

This project will replace aging and undersized stormwater collection pipes that are in poor condition and reduce infiltration and increase capacity. There will also be a hydrodynamic separator installed at the outfall to improve water quality of the discharge prior to it entering Santa Rosa Sound.

Total award amount: \$963,824

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STORMWATER PROJECTS

Okaloosa County Stormwater Projects

These stormwater improvement projects at the Tanglewood and Overbrook stormwater facilities will provide additional storage and treatment to two poorly functioning facilities that discharge into the Gap Creek basin.

Total award amount: \$483,815

Background

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STORMWATER PROJECT

City of Gulf Breeze Stormwater Project

This stormwater improvement project includes the replacement of aging and inadequate drainage pipes, new pumps for the stormwater pumping stations, replacement and upgrade to stormwater outfalls into Pensacola Bay and East Bay and the installation of a hydrodynamic separator at the Pensacola Bay outfall.

Total award amount: \$1,570,827
